Essay Guidelines:

- a. The ASL essay should be no longer than 3-4 minutes.
- b. Essay content should be original and signed by you without any outside assistance.
- c. The essay will be judged for organization, content, and creativity.
- d. Ensure the recording is as clear as possible, paying attention to background distractions, selection of attire, and film quality. Beware of submitting blurry videos or being too close or too far from the recording equipment.
- d. Please state your full name at the beginning of the essay.
