Eligibility Statement

Deadline: May 1, 2020

Undergraduate students currently majoring or minoring in American Sign Language, Deaf Studies, Deaf Education, or Interpreter Preparation at a community college, college, or university may apply for this scholarship.

Applicants must belong to a chapter of the ASL Honor Society on their college campus to be eligible.

Family members of ASLHS and ASLTA-affiliated individuals are barred from applying.

2020 National College ASL Scholarship, Part A

Before submitting your scholarship application, first verify that your institution's membership with the ASL Honor Society is **current**.

Do this by:

Step 1: Visit the *Chapters* page of the ASLHS website
(www.aslhonorsociety.org/Chapters.html)

Step 2: Scroll down and find your state and institution name.

Step 3: If there is an instructor's name and check mark for your school, send in your scholarship application.

Step 4: If there is no instructor name or check mark, your scholarship application will not be processed because your institution is not an active ASLHS member for 2018-2019. See Step 6 for more information.

Step 5: If your institution does not appear on the list at all, then your scholarship application will not be processed because your institution is not an active ASLHS member for 2019-2020. See Step 6 for more information.

Step 6: If your school is not an active member of the ASL Honor Society, discuss your interest in applying for the ASL Scholarship with one of the ASL instructors on your campus. Note that unless your institution joins the ASLHS, your scholarship cannot be processed. ASLHS membership needs to be taken care of prior to submitting your ASL scholarship application.

If your school is not listed on the ASLHS website, and your school IS registered, ask your teacher/professor to print the membership receipt. Include this receipt in your application packet.

Written Essay

Instructions: Please attach your essay as a separate document. You may print a copy and include it with your application, or submit a digital copy on the same USB thumbnail drive used for your ASL essay. Save the digital file in a .doc, .txt, or .pdf file format.

Essay Guidelines:

- a. **Minimum one page, single spaced;** maximum two pages.
- b. Essay content should be original and written by you **without** any outside assistance.
- c. The essay will be judged for content, organization, and clarity.
- d. Give the essay a title.
- e. Make sure your name appears below the essay title.

Essay Topic:

Audism continues to have a profound effect on the lives of Deaf individuals and is often a topic of conversation within the Deaf community. However, those outside of the Deaf community rarely encounter the term, "Audism". ASL Essay

Instructions: Please attach your ASL essay on a **USB thumbnail drive**. Essays on DVD will not be accepted. Acceptable digital formats are .mov, .avi, .wmv, DV, RM, DivX, and MPEG 1, 2, or 3. The USB thumbnail drive must be mailed with the application packet and will not be returned.

Essay Guidelines:

- a. **The ASL essay should be at least 2 minutes long, but no longer than 4-5 minutes.**
- b. Essay content should be original and signed by you **without** any outside assistance.
- c. The essay will be judged for content, organization, and clarity.
- d. Ensure the recording is as clear as possible. Pay attention to:
background distractions, selection of attire, and film quality.
Beware of submitting blurry videos or being too close or too far from the recording equipment.
- e. Please state your full name at the beginning of the video essay.
- f. Failure to follow the above instructions will automatically disqualify this application.

Essay Topic:

Suppose you could travel into the past and give advice to that generation's teenagers interested in taking ASL courses in high school. What advice would you give them during their learning process? What pros/cons would you share? How would you persuade prospect high school students the beneficial rewards of learning ASL as a language?
